Vision 21: LSC Starts Piloting the Virginia Victimization Screen

After 10 months of planning, training and working with pilot agencies, the six month pilot study of the Virginia Victimization Screen (VVS) started on June 5th. Five agencies in Charlottesville City/Albemarle County and three agencies in Washington County are included in the first round of piloting.

Goals of this round of pilot study include training front-line service providers to effectively administer the VVS; providing consistent support to all pilot partners; facilitating additional topic-specific trainings based on pilot partner needs in order to enhance the knowledge and expertise of VVS administrators; evaluating the training and VVS administration process for successes and challenges; and collecting qualitative/quantitative data based on the VVS from pilot partners. Project staff will meet with VVS administrators from 1-2 pilot agencies on a monthly basis to collect data. Two quarterly focus groups with VVS administrators and their supervisors (those who are part of the original pilot discussions) will provide additional qualitative feedback and suggestions for revision to the VVS and overall screening process. Laurie Crawford, Project Manager, is the technical assistance lead for Charlottesville City/Albemarle County and Jenna Foster, Project Co-Convener, is the technical assistance lead for Washington County.

Project staff and an ad hoc committee will be recruiting one or two additional pilot communities in July and August. Pilot site orientation webinars were held on July 12th and July 20th and staff from a variety of child and family serving agencies from across the Commonwealth participated. Because we recognize that school personnel often have exposure to children and youth before other more formal system players, for the next round of pilot sites, priority will be given to urban communities and localities wherein the local school system is a committed partner.

The Vision 21: Linking Systems of Care for Children and Youth (LSC) State Demonstration Project aims to bring together all of the relevant systems and professionals to provide early identification, intervention and treatment for child and youth victims of crime and their families.

Summer 2017 Implementation Phase Achievements:

- Participated in 13 Technical Assistance calls with the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, (NCJFCJ), the National Institute of Justice (NIJ), ICF, and the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC)
- Received IRB approval from Virginia Commonwealth University and the Department of Juvenile Justice to pilot the Virginia Victimization Screen (VVS), training and training manual.
- Launched the VVS in Charlottesville City/Albemarle County and Washington County.
- Hosted an All-Sites meeting in Richmond May 3rd-4th. Participants included: Vision 21: LSC demonstration site project staff, OVC, the National Steering Committee, ICF, staff from pilot site agencies in Charlottesville/Albemarle and Washington County, and Virginia's Partner Agency Team.
- Participated in a site visit with NCJFCJ in Richmond.
